ENVIRONMENTAL

On the environmental side of our mission, the Bayou Vermilion District manages boat, canoe and kayak launches in addition to public parks along the river in an effort to promote recreation along the Vermilion. The **Bayou** Vermilion District also removes trash and large debris from the Vermilion River in addition to working with local government to monitor the water guality and water height of the Vermilion. We also work with the school board to educate students in Lafavette Parish about our Watershed and their role in helping to maintain water guality in the Vermilion.

CULTURAL

On the cultural side of our mission, the Bayou Vermilion District opened the Vermilionville Living History Museum and Folklife Park as a way to preserve and represent the Acadian, Creole, Native American cultures and people of African descent in the Attakapas region. Since its opening in 1990, the historic village has become one of Lafayette's premiere tourist attractions welcoming more than 50,000 visitors each year from around the world. Vermilionville sits on a beautiful tree-covered 23-acre site on the banks of the Bayou Vermilion in the heart of Lafayette, providing a place for history, music, food, cultural exchange, dance, historic architecture and much more.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

Thirty years ago, on April 1, 1990, Vermilionville Living History Museum and Folklife Park, as an integral part of the Lafayette Parish Bayou Vermilion District's masterplan and mission, opened its doors to the public for the first time. Since then, over a million visitors from all fifty states and dozens of countries have come through our doors. Vermilionville has been lauded by many as the centerpiece of our region's cultural tourism industry that has flourished into a vital part of the overall economy.

The last thirty years have not been without their challenges. Vermilionville is making great strides to include the many voices who came together to tell the story of the region in a multi-faceted approach. Much of this past year has been dedicated to the creation of a new strategic plan both for our benefit, but also for accreditation with the American Alliance of Museums.

As part of this process, we interviewed numerous stakeholders, either in person or through written questions. These stakeholders ranged from elected officials and business leaders, to members of local cultures we are tasked with representing, to arts and culture professionals. We sought out and received their input as well our members' and regular visitors' ideas on how to improve representing the history and culture of the area.

As we work to make Vermilionville as inclusive as possible, we have run into a formidable obstacle: the COVID-19 pandemic. Museums, restaurants, and large public gatherings have been shut down. Under these unprecedented circumstances, there is much uncertainty as to what the future holds. However, our strategic planning process has put us in a good position moving forward.

Our strategic plan for Vermilionville includes three main goals and how we plan to achieve them. They are 1) Museum Excellence, 2) Broadening Community Support, and 3) Organizational Effectiveness. On the Bayou Operations side, we continue to collect the equivalent of over a thousand 55-gallon drums' worth of trash each year, in addition to numerous trees, livestock and pets, hundreds of tires, and various and sundry appliances, furniture and sporting equipment.

Our plan takes into account several outside factors that either will directly or indirectly affect Vermilionville. The biggest long-term project is by far the planned Interstate-49 (I-49) Connector, which will most likely have an on/ off ramp near Vermilionville. Bringing the thruway up to interstate standards has long been in the planning stages. The proposed interstate has catalyzed improvement projects along the corridor to mitigate any detrimental effects that may be incurred through the passage of a major highway through the heart of the city. Our proximity to the airport assures that access to Vermilionville will not be interrupted once the work begins. However, the continued delays and the uncertainty caused by the COVID-19 crisis may delay the improvements planned. In the shorter term, in 2019 we began the process to construct a new Water Quality Lab and Watershed Exhibit on our campus. It will house a water-testing lab that will work hand-in-hand with our septic tank inspection program to reassure the public that the Vermilion is a healthy, vibrant waterway that all citizens and visitors in the parish can enjoy. The exhibit will educate the public about what part it can play in making sure we achieve that goal.


