ABOUT THE BAYOU VERMILION DISTRICT

The Bayou Vermilion District (BVD) was established by the Louisiana State Legislature in 1984 as the agency responsible for the health of the Bayou Vermilion as a recreational, cultural, and economic asset in Lafayette Parish.

Today, the BVD directly monitors and maintains the Bayou Vermilion within Lafayette Parish, removing hundreds of cubic yards of debris and trash from the river annually. It also chairs a cross-agency Water Quality Task Force and conducts regular water quality testing and reporting. It maintains boat and kayak launches along the Bayou throughout Lafayette Parish, and encourages recreational uses of the Bayou through programming, lessons, and equipment rentals.

In support of its cultural and economic development mission, the BVD in 1990 established Vermilionville, a one-of-a-kind living history museum on the banks of the Bayou that celebrates the history and culture of the Native American, Creole, Acadian, and African peoples in the Attakapas

region through the end of the 1800s. Today, Vermilionville draws more than 40,000 visitors annually and is the base of the BVD's operations.

JURISDICTION & MISSION

In its establishing legislation*, the State of Louisiana charged the Bayou Vermilion District with:

- Improving the water quality of and beautifying Bayou Vermilion in the parish of Lafayette in an effort to promote the Bayou as a recreational and cultural asset.
- 2. Creating and controlling a new type of viable economic development adjacent to Bayou Vermilion so as to provide a diversified economic base for the city and parish of Lafayette.
- 3. Doing any and all other acts which would enhance the general condition of Bayou Vermilion.

A NEED FOR NEW PLANNING

Over the last 40 years, the nature of the challenges and opportunities facing the BVD has changed. Development and sprawl have reshaped the Vermilion Watershed, especially in the southern half of Lafayette Parish. Contamination from non-point sources has brought the Bayou's water quality to a crisis point. While some areas of the parish have boomed, others have been subject to disinvestment. Public access to the Bayou is scarce. A changing climate is upending historic drainage and weather patterns. These challenges require a new focus and vision for the Bayou and new planning to guide the Bayou Vermilion District over the next 40 years.

3 STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT & GOAL SETTING



On May 9, 2024 the Bayou Vermilion District gathered stakeholders representing community organizations, governmental agencies, non-profits, business leaders, culture bearers, and BVD leadership and staff to discuss the past, present, and future of the Bayou Vermilion District. Over the course of the day, stakeholders shared their aspirations for both the Bayou and the Bayou Vermilion District, identified challenges and opportunities, and articulated priorities and partnerships that should be reflected in a future master planning process.

Several themes emerged across discussion groups at the May 9 workshop:

- Addressing water quality impairment from non-point sources is a high priority, as well as a considerable challenge.
- The Bayou and the Bayou Vermilion District are overlooked and under-appreciated resources.

- There is a desire for connected, accessible, and equitable recreational and cultural facilities across Lafayette Parish.
- There are opportunities to celebrate the region's history and culture along the full length of the Bayou.
- The BVD should have a greater role in guiding development, planning, and enforcement decisions that impact the Bayou.
- There is a desire to forge stronger connections between the residents of Lafayette, the Bayou Vermilion District, and the Bayou itself.

Collectively, these themes point to a vision of a healthy, visible, accessible, living Bayou Vermilion for all to enjoy and benefit from. Attendees highlighted opportunities for the Bayou Vermilion District to achieve this vision through advocacy, investment, protections, education and awareness, and developing a stronger bond between residents of Lafayette and the Bayou itself.

Uplift the Bayou's unique cultures, ecologies, and histories and raise awareness of the issues affecting the Bayou today and in the future.

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
PLANNING PROCESS AND NEXT STEPS
